INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT

Miami Dade College Foundation, Inc.
Miami, Florida

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Miami Dade College Foundation, Inc., which comprise the statement of financial position as of March 31, 2020, and the related statement of activities and cash flow for the year then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditors' Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.



We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Miami Dade College Foundation, Inc. as of March 31, 2020, and the changes in its net assets and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Note 1 - Nature of Operations

Miami Dade College Foundation, Inc. (the “Foundation”) is a Florida not-for-profit corporation formed to serve as a direct-support organization, as defined in Section 1004.70 of the Florida Statutes, of Miami Dade College (the “College”), which is legally separate but financially accountable to the College. The Foundation was organized and operates exclusively to receive, hold, invest, and administer property and to make expenditures to, or for the benefit of the College including educational and cultural events. The change in net assets and financial position of the Foundation may differ from those which might be obtained if the Foundation was not a direct-support organization of the College. The effect of those differences may be material.

The Foundation strives to continue to build a permanent endowment to support the College, maintain an “open-door” policy that ensures no student is denied access for financial reasons, and develop a broad-based constituent support at the local, state, national and international levels to enhance and to continue growth of the College.

The Foundation accomplishes its mission and goals primarily through the following programs:

Scholarships and student aid: Scholarships and student aid provide funds to pay for tuition, books, fees, student financial emergencies and other basic needs such as food insecurity.

Program support for the College: Program support for the College pays for developing new academic programs that align with emerging workforce needs and have been funded by donors who make restricted gifts for this purpose. Program support also includes programmatic support of the Miami Book Fair and Miami Film Festival with funds restricted for these purposes.

Note 2 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Financial Statement Presentation

The accompanying financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

New Accounting Pronouncements

The Financial Accounting Standards Board (“FASB”) has issued several pronouncements that have effective dates in the future that may impact future financial presentations.

ASU No. 2020-07, *Not-for-Profit Entities (Topic 958)*

Presentation and Disclosures by Not-for-Profit Entities for Contributed Nonfinancial Assets

The Board is issuing this update to improve generally accepted accounting principles (“GAAP”) by increasing the transparency of contributed nonfinancial assets for not-for-profit (“NFP”) entities through enhancements to presentation and disclosure.

The amendments in this update apply to NFPs that receive contributed nonfinancial assets. Contribution revenue may be presented in the financial statements using different terms (for example, gifts, donations, grants, gifts-in-kind, donated services, or other terms).

The amendments in this update improve financial reporting by providing new presentation and disclosure requirements about contributed nonfinancial assets for NFPs, including additional disclosure requirements for recognized contributed services. The amendments will not change the recognition and measurement requirements in Subtopic 958-605, *Not-for-Profit Entities—Revenue Recognition*, for those assets.

The amendments in this update should be applied on a retrospective basis and are effective for annual periods beginning after June 15, 2021, and interim periods within annual periods beginning after June 15, 2022. Early adoption is permitted.

Management has determined that this statement has no effect on the Foundation’s financial statements.

ASU No. 2016-02, (Updated No. 2020-05), *Leases (Topic 842)*

In February 2016, the FASB issued ASU No. 2016-02, *Leases (Topic 842)*, which is intended to increase transparency and comparability among organizations by recognizing lease assets and lease liabilities on the balance sheet and disclosing key information about leasing arrangements. Lessor accounting is largely unchanged from that applied under previous GAAP. The new pronouncement is effective for entities within the “all other” category for fiscal years beginning after December 15, 2021, and interim periods within fiscal years beginning after December 15, 2022. Additionally, *Leases* is effective for fiscal years beginning after December 15, 2019, including interim periods within those fiscal years, for public NFP entities that have not yet issued financial statements (or made available for issuance) reflecting the adoption of *Leases*.

Early application of the amendments in this update is permitted for all entities.

Management has determined that this statement has no effect on the Foundation’s financial statements.

ASU 2014-09 (Updated No. 2020-05), *Revenue from Contracts with Customers (Topic 606)*

In May 2014, the FASB issued ASU 2014-09, *Revenue from Contracts with Customers (Topic 606)*, which is a comprehensive new revenue recognition standard that will supersede existing revenue recognition guidance. The core principle of guidance is that an entity should recognize revenue to depict the transfer of promised goods or services to customers in an amount that reflects the consideration to which the entity expects to be entitled in exchange for those goods or services. Certain entities that have not yet issued their financial statements (or made financial statements available for issuance) reflecting the adoption of the Revenue ASU may elect to adopt the guidance for annual reporting periods beginning after December 15, 2019, and for interim reporting periods within annual reporting periods beginning after December 15, 2020. Those entities may elect to follow the original effective date of annual reporting periods beginning after December 15, 2018, and interim reporting periods within annual reporting periods beginning after December 15, 2019.

Management has not currently determined what effect the implementation of this statement may have on the Foundation's financial statements.

ASU No. 2014-09 (Update No. 2020-01), *Investments—Equity Securities (Topic 321), Investments—Equity Method and Joint Ventures (Topic 323), and Derivatives and Hedging (Topic 815)*

In January 2016, the FASB issued Accounting Standards Update No. 2016-01, *Financial Instruments—Overall (Subtopic 825-10): Recognition and Measurement of Financial Assets and Financial Liabilities*, which added Topic 321, *Investments—Equity Securities*, and made targeted improvements to address certain aspects of accounting for financial instruments. One of those improvements provided an entity with the ability to measure certain equity securities without a readily determinable fair value at cost, minus impairment, if any.

The amendments in this Update affect all entities that apply the guidance in Topics 321, 323, and 815 and (1) elect to apply the measurement alternative or (2) enter into a forward contract or purchase an option to purchase securities that, upon settlement of the forward contract or exercise of the purchased option, would be accounted for under the equity method of accounting.

The amendments in this Update clarify the interaction of the accounting for equity securities under Topic 321 and investments accounted for under the equity method of accounting in Topic 323 and the accounting for certain forward contracts and purchased options accounted for under Topic 815. These amendments also improve current GAAP by reducing diversity in practice and increasing comparability of the accounting for these interactions.

The amendments are effective for fiscal years beginning after December 15, 2021, and interim periods within those fiscal years. Early adoption is permitted.

Management has determined that this statement has no effect on the Foundation’s financial statements.

Classification of Net Assets

Net assets are classified based on the presence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions. Net assets are comprised of two groups as follows:

Net assets without donor restrictions – Amounts that are not subject to usage restrictions based on donor-imposed requirements. This class also includes assets previously restricted where restrictions have expired or been met. The governing board has determined certain amounts for board designated endowments.

Net Assets with Donor Restrictions – Amounts subject to usage limitations based on donor-imposed or grantor restrictions. These restrictions may be temporary or may be based on a particular use. Restrictions may be met by the passage of time or by actions of the Foundation. Certain restrictions where the donor has stipulated the amounts must be held in perpetuity.

Earnings related to restricted net assets will be included in net assets without donor restrictions unless otherwise specifically required to be included in donor restricted net assets by the donor or by applicable state law.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

The Foundation considers all highly liquid instruments with a purchased maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents, including the Foundation’s investment in the Florida State Board of Administration Local Government Surplus Trust Fund Investment Pool (“SBA”). The Foundation’s investments in the SBA, a Securities and Exchange Commission Rule 2a-7 like external investment pool, are similar to money market funds in which shares are owned in the fund rather than the underlying investments, which have weighted average maturities of 60 days or less. The Foundation’s investment in the SBA at March 31, 2020 amounted to \$572,911.

Included in cash and cash equivalents are restricted cash balances. Amounts included in restricted cash represent those required to be set aside by a contractual agreement by donors for future scholarships and for capital projects. As of March 31, 2020, these restricted cash amounts could not be fully determined. Please also see Note 5 - Liquidity and Availability of Financial Assets.

Cash and Cash Equivalents (continued)

Concentrations of Credit Risk

Financial instruments that potentially subject the Foundation to concentrations of credit risk consist primarily of cash and cash equivalents and investments. The Foundation maintains cash deposits at certain financial institutions, which exceed federally insured limits of \$250,000 per financial institution. The Foundation maintains a portion of their investment portfolio with the State Board of Administration of Florida and the Florida Treasury Investment Pool.

Revenue Recognition

Revenues are reported as increases in net assets without donor restrictions unless use of the related asset is limited by donor-imposed restrictions. Gains and losses on investments and other assets or liabilities are reported as increases or decreases in net assets without donor restrictions unless their use is restricted by explicit donor stipulation or by law.

Investments

The Foundation's investments are reported at their fair values in the statements of financial position. Investment return includes realized and unrealized gains and losses, interest and dividend income, net of investment fees, and is included in the statements of activities as changes in net assets. Market risk is inherent and is dependent on the future changes in market prices of the various investments held.

Securities Lending

The Foundation participates in a securities lending program to optimize investment income. The Foundation loans certain investment securities for short periods of time in exchange for collateral initially equal to at least 102% of the fair value of the investment securities on loan. The fair value of the loaned investment securities is monitored on a daily basis, with additional collateral obtained or refunded as the fair value of the loaned investment securities fluctuate. The collateral, which may be in the form of cash, letters of credit, or U.S. government securities, is deposited by the borrower with an independent lending agent. The collateral is recorded as an asset on the Foundation's statements of financial position, along with a liability to reflect the Foundation's obligation to return the collateral. The collateral is invested by the lending agent according to the Foundation's investment guidelines. The Foundation does not have access to the collateral unless there is default by the borrower. Loaned securities continue to be carried as investments on the statements of financial position. Earnings on the invested collateral, net of expense, are recorded as other income in the accompanying statements of activities.

Valuation of Investments at Fair Value - Definition and Hierarchy

Fair value is defined as the price that the Foundation would receive to sell an asset or pay to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction with an independent counter-party in the principal market or in the absence of a principal market, the most advantageous market for the asset or liability. Fair value measurements establishes a three-tier hierarchy to distinguish between (1) inputs that reflect the assumptions market participants would use in pricing an asset or liability developed based on market data obtained from sources independent of the reporting entity (observable inputs) and (2) inputs that reflect the reporting entity's own assumptions about the assumptions market participants would use in pricing an asset or liability developed based on the best information available in the circumstances (unobservable inputs) and to establish a classification of fair value measurements for disclosure purposes. The inputs are summarized in the three broad levels listed below.

Level 1—Quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities.

Level 2—Other significant observable inputs (including quoted prices for similar investments, interest rates, credit risk, etc.)

Level 3—Significant unobservable inputs (including the Foundation's own assumptions in determining the fair value of investments)

In applying the provisions of fair value measurements to the Foundation's investment activities during the year, the following valuation techniques have been employed:

Short-term Investments - Short-term investments consists primarily of cash and cash equivalents held at an investment broker. The transaction price of the short-term investments is typically the Foundation's best estimate of fair value. The Foundation's short-term investments are categorized in Level 1 of the fair value hierarchy.

Federal Agency Debt Securities - The fair value of federal agency debt securities is generally based on quoted prices in active markets. When quoted prices are not available, fair value is determined based on a valuation model that uses inputs that include interest-rate yield curves, cross-currency-basis index spreads, and country credit spreads similar to the bond in terms of issuer, maturity, and seniority. The Foundation's investments in federal agency debt securities are categorized in Level 1 of the fair value hierarchy.

Valuation of Investments at Fair Value - Definition and Hierarchy (continued)

Equity Securities - Securities and other investments traded on a national exchange or on the national market system of NASDAQ are valued at their last reported sale price or, if there has been no sale on that date, at the closing "bid" price if long, or closing "ask" price if short. Other securities or investments for which over-the-counter market quotations are available are valued at their last reported sale price or, if there had been no sale on that date, at closing "bid" price if long, or closing "ask" price if short as reported by a reputable source selected by the Foundation. The Foundation has sole and absolute discretion in valuing any positions for which market quotations are not readily available or in adjusting the valuation of any other positions. The Foundation's investments in equity securities are categorized in Level 1 and Level 2 of the fair value hierarchy.

Mutual Funds - Mutual funds are valued at their net asset values, which are determined daily and are quoted on a national exchange. The Foundation's investments in mutual funds are categorized in Level 1 of the fair value hierarchy.

Debt Securities - The fair value of debt securities is estimated using recently executed transactions, market price quotations (where observable), bond spreads or credit default swap spreads. The spread data used are for the same maturity as the bond. If the spread data does not reference the issuer, then data that references a comparable issuer is used. When observable price quotations are not available, fair value is determined based on cash flow models with yield curves, bond, or single-name credit default swap spreads and recovery rates based on collateral values as key inputs. The Foundation's investments in debt securities are categorized in Level 2 of the fair value hierarchy.

Government Investment Pool - The Foundation invests in a government investment pool that is primarily invested in a combination of short-term liquid instruments and intermediate term fixed income securities. The Foundation records the fair value of its investment in the government investment pool based on the Foundation's proportionate share of the underlying fair value of the government investment pool's net asset value as a practical expedient to estimate fair value. The net asset value is provided by the government investment pool. Accordingly, the estimated fair values may differ significantly from the values that would have been used had a ready market existed for these investments.

Valuation of Investments at Fair Value - Definition and Hierarchy (continued)

Investments in Funds - Investments in investment funds (the “investee funds”), are valued, as a practical expedient, utilizing the net asset valuations provided by the underlying investee funds without adjustment, when the net asset valuations of the investments are calculated (or adjusted by the Foundation if necessary) in a manner consistent with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (“GAAP”) for investment companies. The Foundation applies the practical expedient to its investments in investee funds on an investment-by-investment basis, and consistently with the Foundation’s entire position in a particular investment, unless it is probable that the Foundation will sell a portion of an investment at an amount different from the net asset valuation. If it is probable that the Foundation will sell an investment at an amount different from the net asset valuation or in other situations where practical expedient is not available, the Foundation considers other factors in addition to the net asset valuation, such as features of the investment, including subscription and redemption rights, expected discounted cash flows, transactions in secondary market, bids received from potential buyers, and overall market conditions in its determination of fair value.

The underlying investee funds value securities and other financial instruments on a mark-to-market or other estimated fair value basis. The estimated fair values of substantially all of the investments of the underlying investee funds, which may include securities for which prices are not readily available, are determined by the general partner or management of the respective underlying investee funds and may not reflect amounts that could be realized upon immediate sale, nor amounts that ultimately may be realized. Accordingly, the estimated fair values may differ significantly from the values that would have been used had a ready market existed for these investments.

Contributions Receivable

Contributions receivable are donor obligations due under normal contribution terms. The Foundation receives contributions primarily from donors who have pledged wills, unconditional promises, and endowments as a result of the Foundation's fundraising efforts. Contributions receivable due in the next year are recorded at their net realizable value. Contributions receivable due in subsequent years are reported at their net realizable value using risk-free interest rates applicable to the maturity of the contributions receivable, which approximates fair value. Management reviews contributions receivable on a regular basis to determine collectability and includes any contribution receivable balances that are determined to be uncollectible, along with a general reserve, in its overall allowance for doubtful accounts. After all attempts to collect a receivable have failed, the receivable is written off against the allowance. At March 31, 2020, net contributions receivable from two donors amounted to approximately 57% of total net contributions receivable.

Due from the College

Amounts due from the College are stated at the outstanding balance of funds due. The carrying amount may be reduced by an allowance that reflects management's best estimate of the amounts that will not be collected. As management believes that the amounts are fully collectible and are therefore stated at net realizable value, management has not recorded an allowance for doubtful accounts.

Collections of Artwork

The Foundation has adopted a policy of not capitalizing collections of artwork in its financial statements. Accordingly, no collection items are recognized as assets when they are received as a donation. The Foundation does acknowledge its donors and the items are administered and inventoried by the College.

Contributions

Contributions, including unconditional promises are recognized as revenue when the donor's commitment is received. Unconditional promises are recognized at the estimated present value of the future cash flows, net of allowances, which approximates fair value. Promises made and collected in the same accounting period are recorded when received in the appropriate net asset category. Promises of non-cash assets are recorded at their fair value. Conditional promises are recorded when donor stipulations are substantially met.

When a donor restriction expires, that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished, net assets with donor restrictions are reclassified to net assets without donor restrictions and reported in the statements of activities as net assets released from restrictions. Donor restricted contributions whose restrictions are met in the same reporting period are recorded as net assets without donor restriction support. For the year ended March 31, 2020, net revenue from two donors accounted for approximately 40% of total revenue and support.

Contributed Services

The College provides certain services to the Foundation, primarily the use of office space and employees. For the year ended March 31, 2020, the value of such services amounted to \$197,396, including office space valued at \$118,770. These services have been recognized as contributed services revenue and expenses in the accompanying statements of activities.

Advertising and Promotion

Advertising and promotion costs are primarily related to cultural and educational events held by the College. These costs are expensed as incurred. For the year ended March 31, 2020, advertising and promotion expenses amounted to \$328,452.

Fair Value of Financial Instruments

The Foundation is required to disclose estimated fair values for their financial instruments. The following methods and assumptions were used by the Foundation in estimating the fair values of each class of financial instruments disclosed herein:

Cash and cash equivalents, and securities lending invested collateral – Based on their short-term nature, the carrying amounts reported in the statements of financial position are reasonable estimates of their fair value.

Contributions receivable – Contributions receivable are recorded at the present value of the discounted future cash flow, based on current market interest rates. The carrying value of contribution receivable, therefore approximates their fair value.

Due from the College – Based on its short-term nature, the carrying amount reported in the statements of financial position is a reasonable estimate of its fair value.

Securities lending payable – Based on their short-term nature, the carrying amounts reported in the statements of financial position are reasonable estimates of their fair value.

Due to the College – Based on their short-term nature, the carrying amounts reported in the statements of financial position are reasonable estimates of their fair value.

Income Taxes

The Foundation is exempt from Federal income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the United States Internal Revenue Code and is not a private foundation. Gifts to the Foundation are tax deductible. Certain activities not directly related to the Foundation's tax-exempt purpose could be subject to taxation as unrelated business income.

The Foundation assesses its tax position in accordance with "Accounting for Uncertainties in Income Taxes" as prescribed by the *Accounting Standards Codification*, which provides guidance for financial statement recognition and measurement of uncertain tax positions taken or expected to be taken in a tax return for open tax years (generally a period of three years from the later of each return's due date or the date filed) that remain subject to examination by the Foundation's major tax jurisdictions.

Income Taxes (continued)

The Foundation assesses its tax positions and determines whether it has material unrecognized liabilities for uncertain tax positions. The Foundation records these liabilities to the extent that it deems them more likely than not to be incurred. Interest and penalties related to uncertain tax positions, if any, would be classified as a component of income tax expense.

The Foundation believes that it does not have any significant uncertain tax positions requiring recognition or measurement in the accompanying financial statements.

Use of Estimates in the Preparation of Financial Statements

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosures of contingent assets and liabilities as of the statement of financial position dates and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting periods. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Note 3 - Investments and Fair Value Measurements

The Foundation's investments recorded at fair value have been categorized based upon a fair value hierarchy in accordance with the fair value measurements and the Foundation's accounting policies as disclosed in Note 1. Note 4 - Endowment

The Foundation follows the Florida Uniform Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act (“FUPMIFA”) and its own governing documents. FUPMIFA requires the Foundation to prudently manage its funds. In the absence of donor restrictions, the net appreciation on a donor-restricted endowment fund is spendable under FUPMIFA. The majority of the Foundation’s donors have placed restrictions on the use of the investment income or net appreciation resulting from the donor-restricted endowment funds.

Management has determined that the majority of the Foundation’s contributions are subject to the terms of its governing documents. Certain contributions are received subject to other gift instruments or are subject to specific agreements with the Foundation.

The Foundation’s investment guidelines and policies are overseen by members of the investment committee reporting to the Foundation’s board of directors. The Foundation has adopted investment and endowment spending policies, approved by the board of directors, to achieve, at a minimum, a real (inflation adjusted) total return, net of investment management fees, that is consistent with endowment spending policy requirements. The Foundation’s investment and endowment spending policies work together to achieve this objective.

Note 4 - Endowment (continued)

The strategic (long-term) asset allocation strategy of the Foundation is to maximize total return within acceptable risk parameters. The strategic asset allocation targets and the accompanying tolerance ranges are recommended by the investment committee and approved by the board of directors, in an effort to reflect the financial needs of the Foundation as outlined in the endowment spending policy.

The endowment spending policy calculates the amount of money annually distributed from the Foundation’s endowment fund, primarily for scholarships and program support. The current endowment spending policy distributes an amount at least equal to 5% (net of investment and management fees) of a moving three-year average of the endowment’s fair value. Additionally, 2% of the moving three-year average of the endowment’s fair value is distributed to the Foundation’s net assets without donor restrictions as an administration fee. All excess earnings and spending appropriations not distributed will remain as part of the endowment fund to hedge against inflation and other threats to loss of purchasing power. Earnings from accounts established during the fiscal year will not be available for distribution until the beginning of the following fiscal year.

The Foundation’s budget and finance committee, may, at its discretion, have the flexibility to allow additional sums of reinvested corpus earnings to be transferred to expenditure and/or interest earning accounts for unexpected or infrequent circumstances on a case by case basis. This is consistent with the Foundation’s objective to maintain the purchasing power of the endowment assets as well as to provide additional real growth through investment return.

Board Designated Endowment Funds – In fiscal year 2020, the Foundation became aware of a misallocation of investment returns among donor accounts. It was determined that certain endowed donor accounts had been over-allocated investment returns. The over-allocated investment returns represented earnings that should have been designated for the Foundation’s general spending purposes and classified as unrestricted funds. The Foundation’s board of directors has decided to maintain the balances within these over-allocated endowed donor accounts at their previously over-allocated balances by designating unrestricted funds to be used for the purposes of the endowed donors’ original intent.

From time to time, certain donor-restricted endowment funds may have fair values less than the amount required to be maintained by donors or by law (underwater endowments). These deficiencies can result from unfavorable market fluctuations and continued appropriation by the Foundation. As of March 31, 2020, funds with an original gift value of \$21,975,512, were underwater by \$3,826,560. See also Note 11 for discussion of prior period adjustments.

As part of the Foundation's liquidity management, the Foundation invests cash in excess of daily requirements in interest bearing accounts, short-term investments and investment securities that are liquid in nature. In addition to the above, per its endowment spending policy, the Foundation receives a 2% administration fee on the moving three-year average of the endowment fair value that is calculated as of March 31 and received on April 1 and is available for general expenditure. For the year ending March 31, 2020, this amount totaled \$1,560,321.

Note 7 - Due From (To) The College

In connection with an arrangement between the College and Foundation, certain amounts are held at the College to facilitate purchases and other transactions on behalf of the Foundation. Additionally, from time to time, it is advantageous to purchase supplies and equipment through the College's procurement office. The Foundation has funds on deposit with the College for this purpose. When purchases are made, the expense is recognized and the receivable reduced. The amount receivable from the College was \$371,754 as of March 31, 2020.

The amount due to the College totaled \$14,534,832 as of March 31, 2020. These balances relate to monies due to the College for scholarships and student aid, endowed teaching chair commitments and other program enhancement support and are settled in the ordinary course of activities.

Note 8 - Transfers and Adjustments

In accordance with their endowment spending policy (Note 4), the Foundation annually records a transfer from net assets with donor restrictions to net assets without donor restrictions for the payment of administrative expenses. Additionally, on occasion donors modify the original restrictions imposed on their contributions, which can result in transfers from net assets with donor restrictions.

Note 10 - Commitments and Contingencies

Economic Conditions

The Foundation depends substantially on contributions and contributed services for its revenues. The ability of certain Foundation contributors to continue giving amounts comparable with prior years may be dependent upon current and future overall economic conditions and the continued deductibility for income tax purposes of contributions to the Foundation. While the Foundation's board of directors believes the organization has the resources to continue its programs, its ability to do so and the extent to which it continues, may be dependent on the above factors.

Note 11 - Prior Period Adjustments

During the fiscal year ended March 31, 2020, certain errors relating to prior periods were identified. Prior period adjustments were made to the Statement of Financial Position balances as of March 31, 2019 and summarized as follows:

Receipt of Donation from College

The Foundation received contributions due from the College in the amount of \$35,200,000 within fiscal year 2020. These contributions had been received by the College from a donor in prior years. The contributions were not recorded by the Foundation as a contribution or a receivable. As \$31,988,000 of these contributions related to prior years, a prior period adjustment was made to the Net Assets balance with a corresponding adjustment to the Due from College balance as of March 31, 2019. The remaining \$3,212,000 related to fiscal year 2020 and was included in contributions.

Miscellaneous Adjustments

In addition to the other prior period adjustments, certain miscellaneous adjustments were made to the net assets balance as of March 31, 2019. These miscellaneous adjustments include corrections for misclassified amounts as contributions rather than fiscal agent liabilities, under-accrued prepaid assets, and fair value adjustments for certain investments as of March 31, 2019. The net impact of these miscellaneous adjustments results in an increase of \$561,140 in the total net assets balance as of March 31, 2019.

Reclassification of Endowed and Non-Endowed Balances

Within fiscal year 2020, the Foundation became aware that certain funds were misclassified as endowments and certain funds qualified as endowments but were not classified as such. The Foundation made adjustments to appropriately classify these funds as of March 31, 2019. Although, these adjustments did not have an impact on total net assets, \$9,926,788 was reclassified from donor restricted to unrestricted net assets.

In addition to the reclassification from donor restricted to unrestricted net asset, the Foundation reclassified \$12,912,013 from donor restricted for endowment to donor restricted non-endowed in the amount of \$10,000,032 and \$2,905,981 to unrestricted funds.

Note 12 - Subsequent Events

The Foundation has evaluated subsequent events through December 17, 2020, which is the date the accompanying financial statements were available to be issued.

In March 2020, the World Health Organization (“WHO”) declared the coronavirus (“COVID 19”), a global pandemic and public health emergency. The WHO has recommended containment and mitigation measures worldwide and domestically, self-isolation and shelter-in-place requirements have been or are being put in place.

At this point, the Foundation cannot reasonably estimate the length or severity of this pandemic, or the extent to which this disruption may impact the Foundation’s financial statements and future results of operations. The Foundation will continue to monitor and evaluate the nature and extent of the impact on our ongoing activities and the potential effect on future contributions or funding and expenses, financial condition, and liquidity.

Note 13 - Functional Expenses

Certain administrative personnel perform duties which benefit both program and support functions. The expenses associated with these personnel are allocated based on the estimated hours devoted to each function. Other common administrative expenses are allocated based on the estimated utilization by the respective function. As a result, certain costs have been allocated among the program and supporting services benefited. The allocation of costs is based on management's estimate, which is periodically reviewed to assess the appropriateness of the cost allocation.
